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You climb at your own risk. Climbing is a dangerous activity carrying the risk of serious injury or death. If you climb, the presumption is that you are aware of and accept these risks together with responsibility for your activities and your safety.

You are the sole judge of conditions, the suitability of any chosen route, the ability of the party and you take sole responsibility for your actions.

Rock is a dynamic medium and rockfalls are frequent. In the mountains the weather changes quickly, climbs change unpredictably; blocks, flakes and holds become loose and fall off, rock becomes vegetated and dirty, in situ gear deteriorates or disappears. Even a minor change can have a dramatic effect on the difficulty or seriousness of a route. There can be no presumption that any given climb will be found in the condition described. It is therefore essential that climbers judge the seriousness or difficulty of any route before committing themselves.

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
## Wild Boar Fell

OS Ref: **SD 763 990** 

Alt: **700m** Rock: **Gritstone** 







The buttresses are of generally good quality gritstone up to 15m in height. However, no matter how good the rock, the climbs have had so few ascents that there is bound to be some loose rock in places. It's a great place to climb as long as you don't expect rock that has been cleaned by the passage of many hands and feet!

The south-easterly aspect means the crag gets the sun from early morning till into the afternoon and is sheltered from prevailing westerly winds. The buttresses are scattered across the hillside.

The main crag of Blackbed Scar is just south of The Nab, with a prominent grassy Amphitheatre splitting the crag.

Further south are more buttresses and High White Scar below the columns of stone men.

Belay stakes are in place above some buttresses (use at your own risk), but there are alternative natural gear cracks and blocks above most buttresses. Views are impressive and you may be lucky enough to look down upon a steam special on the Settle-Carlisle Line.

The climbs have had very few ascents and many have not been on-sighted, so the grades are approximate. When in doubt, the higher grade has been listed.

The climbs are described in relation to the various buttresses going from right to left with the routes on the buttresses described from left to right.

Care should be taken when approach the base of the buttresses and also when traversing along the top when descending.

#### **Approach**

Enter the Mallerstang valley on the B6259 from the south via Garsdale or from the north via Kirkby Stephen. There is parking for a few cars opposite the access track to Hazelgill Farm. GR SW 783 997. Take this track, the Pennine Bridleway, left of the house going straight up the field and under the railway. Follow the track gradually upwards to a col at 550m. Here a path heads south along the ridge, steepening to a substantial cairn on The Nah

From the cairn on The Nab summit, <u>Perched Block Arête</u> is visible to the right. Walk 30m south to find two small circular ponds and head rightwards down an easy grassy slope to reach the right (looking outwards) edge of the buttress. A few metres down the grassy gully, take a faint sheep trod, past several small cairns. It traverses at a fairly high level, gradually descending to reach the base of <u>Triple Tier Buttress</u>, at the right-angled corner of <u>Born Again</u>. Scramble down a step or two and round the corner; the Amphitheatre will come into view. An alternative, perhaps easier to find, but steeper, descent may be made down the large grassy right-angled bay that is the Amphitheatre. It is about 150m on from the cairn.

Climb the awkward diagonal gash to stand on the spiky block. Step across onto the horizontal crack and traverse right to a comfortable ledge, from which it is possible to reach the top, by moving left. A miniature, but worthwhile, gritstone climb.


### **Blackbed Scar South - Main Wall**

Traverse left, looking in, and descend a grassy gully and slab.





Step left and climb the thin curving crack and flake above to reach the lower right corner of the grid of blocks. Now take a diagonal right to left line across the grid of blocks, to emerge at a large ledge. Climb the pleasing wrinkled arête above, from its left.

Variation: S Ignore the fist-sized crack by stepping up on its left, then traverse right along the substantial ledge to the arête which is climbed to a mossy ledge which can be followed back leftwards to the grid of blocks.

## **Temptation Buttress**

Now traverse excitingly rightwards, to a finish up the arête. (The creaky rectangular flake at 3m adds excitement, moderated by the good gear that can be placed elsewhere, before you lay a hand or foot on it. However, your belayer will probably thank you for positioning them out of the line of fire of the flake). A direct line looks possible.

Nimble Dragon makes a worthwhile HVS 5a \*. Start up Nimble and finish up Snap Dragon.
